The words a, an and the are called articles. A and an are called indefinite articles. The is called a definite article. A is used before words beginning with a consonant sound, eg: a woman, a mango. An is used before words beginning with a vowel sound or a silent 'h', eg: an apple, an hour.

'The' means something definite. We use the when we talk about a particular noun, eg: The man who came to our school was a magician. We also use the before the names of rivers, oceans, seas, mountains, monuments, buildings, newspapers. We also used the before the names of countries with plural names, eg: The Philippines. Before the names of certain cultures, eg: The Chinese dumplings and we also use the before superlatives, for eg: She is the tallest girl in the class and before ordinals, eg: he is the second boy to win a prize. Note: We do not use the before the names of languages, eg: We speak French.
